

Amen.



The **STATIONS OF THE CROSS** or the **Way of the Cross**, also known as the **Way of Sorrows** or the **Via Crucis**, refers to a series of 14 images depicting Jesus Christ on the day of his crucifixion. The stations grew out of imitations of Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem which is believed to be the actual path Jesus walked to Mount Calvary.

The Stations of the Cross are often found in churches as a series of 14 small icons or images and are most commonly prayed during Lent and especially on Good Friday, the day of the year upon which the events actually occurred. The 14 devotions, or stations, focus on specific events of Jesus's the last day, beginning with His condemnation. The stations are often used as a mini pilgrimage as the individual moves from station to station. At each station, the individual recalls and meditates on a specific event from Christ's last day. Specific prayers are recited, then the individual moves to the next station until all 14 are complete.

The Stations may be of stone, wood, or metal, sculptured or carved, or they may be merely paintings or engravings. They are usually ranged at intervals around the walls of a church, though sometimes they are to be found in the open air, especially on roads leading to a church or shrine. The erection and use of the Stations did not become at all general before the end of the seventeenth century, but they are now to be found in almost every church. Formerly their number varied considerably in different places but fourteen are now prescribed by authority. They are as follows:


- I. Christ condemned to death ;
- II. the cross is laid upon him;
- III. His first fall;
- IV. He meets His Blessed Mother;
- V. Simon of Cyrene is made to bear the cross;
- VI. Christ's face is wiped by Veronica;
- VII. His second fall;
- VIII. He meets the women of Jerusalem ;
- IX. His third fall;
- X. He is stripped of His garments;
- XI. His crucifixion;
- XII. His death on the cross;
- XIII. His body is taken down from the cross; and
- XIV. laid in the tomb.

The object of the Stations is to help the faithful to make in spirit, as it were, a pilgrimage to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death, and this has become one of the most popular of Catholic devotions. It is carried out by passing from Station to Station, with certain prayers at each and devout meditation on the various incidents in turn. It is very usual, when the devotion is performed publicly, to sing a stanza of the "Stabat Mater" while passing from one Station to the next.

COMMEMORATED and CELEBRATED THIS WEEK



Monday 1 March



According to tradition, **ST DAVID** was the son of King Sant of South Wales and St. Non. He was ordained a priest and later studied under St. Paulinus. Later, he was involved in missionary work and founded a number of monasteries. The monastery he founded at Menevia in South western Wales was noted for extreme asceticism. David and his monks drank neither wine nor beer, only water while putting in a full day of heavy manual labour and intense study.

Around the year 550, David attended a synod at Brevi in Cardiganshire. His contributions at the synod are said to have been the major cause for his election as primate of the Cambrian Church. He was reportedly consecrated archbishop by the patriarch of Jerusalem while on a visit to the Holy Land. He also is said to have invoked a council that ended the last vestiges of Pelagianism. David died at his monastery in Menevia around the year 589, and his cult was approved in 1120 by Pope Callistus II. He is revered as the **patron of Wales**. Undoubtedly, St David was endowed with substantial qualities of spiritual leadership. What is more, many monasteries flourished as a result of his leadership and good example. His staunch adherence to monastic piety bespeaks a fine example for modern Christians seeking order and form in their prayer life. His feast day is **March 1**.

Tuesday 2 March: St Chad:

The patron saint of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Birmingham.

ST CHAD, was born in Northumbria one of four brothers, all of whom became priests. He was educated partly at Lindisfarne under St Aidan and partly in Ireland. He succeeded his brother St Cedd as Abbot of Lastingham in Yorkshire in 664 and became Bishop of Mercia in 669 when Wulfhere, the first Christian king of Mercia, gave him land to establish his see at Lichfield. Famous for his hard work in spreading the Gospel and helping the poor, he was a humble man who chose to travel everywhere on foot. The story goes that Archbishop Theodore had to persuade him to ride by lifting him bodily on to a horse. He died of the plague on 2 March 672 and pilgrims soon began coming to his grave in Lichfield. Eventually his bones (or relics) were transferred from the graveyard to a magnificent tomb in Lichfield Cathedral and his shrine became one of the great centres of pilgrimage in the Middle Ages. At the time of the Reformation the shrine in Lichfield Cathedral was destroyed but his relics were kept by a Récusant family and now are displayed in a magnificent reliquary above the main altar in St Chad's Cathedral, Birmingham.
