

# The WEEK of PRAYER for CHRISTIAN UNITY is

traditionally celebrated between January 18 and January 25 – originally the octave of St Peter and St Paul.

# MEMORIALS COMMEMORATED THIS WEEK



### 23 January:

**ST NICHOLAS OWEN** ~ was born in Oxford about 1555. He was apprenticed to his father, a carpenter. In 1588 he became the servant of Fr Henry Garnet, the Jesuit superior in England and for seventeen years was employed in making secret hides for priests and church materials including some of those

in Harvington Hall. He was arrested repeatedly and finally at Hindlip House, Worcester on the fourth day of a twelve-day search which he and a colleague, Ralph Astley, had one apple to eat between them. He died under torture in the Tower on 2<sup>nd</sup> March 1606 and was canonised 1970.



## 27 January:

**BL EDWARD OLDCORNE** ~ was born the son of a bricklayer in York 1561. He studied medicine for about three years and then went to Rome where he became a Jesuit priest in 1588. Two years later at Hindlip, he ran a 'receptacle' for priests, in essence a distribution centre for the priests around

Worcestershire and the Welsh Marches areas for the following sixteen years. He was arrested with Fr Garnet at Hindlip and was executed with Ralph Ashley at Red Hill, Worcester on 7<sup>th</sup> April 1606. Humphrey Pakington of Harvington, a'deare frynd' of Thomas Habington at Hindlip, was in Worcester for the trial. Blessed Edward was beatified 1929.
