

# **Tuesday 7 March - Commemoration of Ss Perpetua and Felicity, Martyrs**Saints Perpetua and Felicity, a young noblewoman and her slave, were martyred for their faith in A.D. 203, under the emperor Severus. At the time of their arrest, Perpetua had an infant son, and Felicity was pregnant. In prison, Perpetua wrote a diary that was later published as The Passion of Saints Perpetua and Felicity, one of the earliest writings by a Christian woman.

In it Perpetua described an interaction with her father as he came and begged her to recant: "Father," said I, "do you see this vase here, for example?" "Yes, I do," said he. And I told him: "Could it be called by any other name than what it is?" And he said: "No." "Well, so too I cannot be called anything other than what I am, a Christian."

As penalty for professing the name of Christ, Perpetua and Felicity were sentenced to death. Perpetua and Felicity were thrown into an arena of wild animals, but they were not killed. Tragically, the emperor Severus then commanded that they be put to death by the sword.

## Wednesday 8 March - Commemoration of St John of God, Religious

Having given up active Christian belief while a soldier, John was 40 before the depth of his sinfulness began to dawn on him. He decided to give the rest of his life to God's service and headed at once for Africa where he hoped to free captive Christians and, possibly, be martyred.

He was soon advised that his desire for martyrdom was not spiritually well based and returned to Spain to open a religious book shop. Unsettled and moved by a sermon of Saint John of Avila, he one day engaged in a public beating of himself, begging mercy and wildly repenting for his past life.

Committed to a mental hospital for these actions, John was visited by Saint John, who advised him to be more actively involved in tending to the needs of others rather than in enduring personal hardships. John gained peace of heart, and shortly after left the hospital to begin work among the poor.

He established a house where he tended to the needs of the sick poor. Behind John's outward acts of total concern and love for Christ's sick poor was a deep interior prayer life which was reflected in his spirit of humility. These qualities attracted helpers who, 20 years after John's death, formed the Brothers Hospitallers, now a worldwide religious order.

## Thursday 9 March - Commemoration of St Frances of Rome, Religious

Born of wealthy Roman parents, Frances found herself attracted to the religious life during her youth. But her parents objected and a young nobleman was selected to be her husband. Frances soon discovered that her sister-in-law, Vannozza, also wished to live a life of service and prayer. So the two set out together, with their husbands' blessings, to help the poor.

Frances became convinced that this way of life was essential for the world, and requested and was given permission to found a society of women bound by no vows. They simply offered themselves to God and to the service of the poor. Once the society was established, Frances lived at home with her husband, until he passed away, and then went to live the remainder of her life with the society, serving the poorest of the poor.
